

Wednesday 27 February Dr Jacqueline Cockburn Following in the footsteps of Delacroix in Africa

In 1830 the artist Eugène Delacroix set off for Africa. Drawing from his journals this lecture examines his responses to a new country which

he saw as exotic and discusses why later artists, such as Matisse and Kandinsky, followed in search of some of his magic. Delacroix' working methods and use of colour and the inspirational light of Africa are discussed.



Wednesday 10 April
Dr Karen Pearlman
Australian Film: defining
moments in our national cinema

This lecture introduces key moments in Australian film history from the early 1900s to the present. Enjoy the clips and images that reveal defining

moments such as the 1911 banning of bushranger films; the lyrical and bittersweet Australian New Wave; the crass & entertaining genre films of the 70s & 80s; the sequin covered stories of the 90s and the astounding wave of indigenous film making we are experiencing today.



Wednesday 1 May Bernard Allan Laura Knight: from Newlyn to Nuremburg

From a humble background and limited training in Nottingham, Laura Knight progressed to become one of England's best

known artists and the first female Royal Academician since the 18th century. Her joie de vivre surfaces in art which encompasses sunny beach scenes in Cornwall, portraits of friends, the circus, ballet and theatre. During WWII she received several official commissions, culminating in her famous depiction of the Nuremburg trials of 1946.

Dr Janet Davey
Ancient Egypt: portraits and
masks or how to look gorgeous
in the afterlife

The ancient Egyptians believed that a beautiful or handsome image was essential for the afterlife. This

lecture will take you on an illustrated journey through the evolution of funerary masks, portraits, coffins and sarcophagi. The lecture will show why it was important to present a positive image for the afterlife and how this was achieved by the artists.



Wednesday 3 July David Rosier Ruling from behind the Yellow Silk Screen: The Dowager Empress Cixi

This lecture provides a balanced insight into the life and achievements of one of the most

important women in Chinese Imperial history. With the recent availability of Imperial records, plus re-evaluation of Cixi's life, it is now possible to refute the traditional view that the Dowager Empress was a cruel calculating megalomaniac who hated foreigners, condoned corruption and resisted attempts to modernize China.



Wednesday 7 August Andrew Prince A portrait of jewels: following missing treasures through canvas

This lecture was inspired by a visit to the National Portrait Gallery in London, seeing all the Tudor & Stuart monarchs in all their finery

and wondering what all the jewels were and what had become of them. Among the many jewels traced are some pearls that belonged to Catherine de Medici, Mary, Queen of Scots, Queen Elizabeth I and are now worn by Queen Elizabeth II. Jewel hunting has never been more fascinating.



Wednesday 4 September Colin Davies Zaha Hadid: architectural superstar

Dame Zaha Hadid died suddenly in 2016, at the age of 65. Architectural historians of the future will surely recognise her as one of the most

important architects of the 21st Century.

This lecture tells the story of her career from the visionary projects of the 1980s, through the years of frustration when many of her designs were considered unbuildable, to the prolific crop of international projects built in the last decade of her life.



Wednesday 2 October Anthony Russell Venice: Canaletto and his rivals

This lecture reveals a heady mixture of 'superstar' painter, immensely rich patrons on the move and a city whose modern face hides behind a romantic mask. Canaletto's visions

of Venice, Rome and London, both real and imagined, are magical paintings by an Italian artist greatly influenced by the taste of British 18th century 'grand tourists'. These views depict a serene dreamland and have always been highly prized.
